Editorial

I so often hear players say they don't really understand "sacrificial bidding" so I thought I would try and de-mystify the concept. Much like a pre-emptive bid a sacrifice bid is one you make in the knowledge that you probably won't make your contract but the score you give to the opponents by "going off" will be less than that they can achieve in their bid contract. For example, if your opponents bid and make 4 spades and they are vulnerable they will score 620. However, if you bid to 5 hearts

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and you are not vulnerable but you are doubled, if you only make eight tricks the score your opponents will earn will be 500 which is less than the 620 they would get if allowed to play in 4 spades. As in everything in bridge you will not be successful in your sacrificial bidding all of the time but there are a few tips to help you keep your losses to a minimum.

- 1. You do need to know how to score, if you have no idea then ask Barbara to let you have notes on scoring
- 2. Assume you will be doubled by the opponents
- 3. Look at the vulnerability. If you are vulnerable and your opponents are not and you overbid their game contract you can only afford to go off one trick; however if they are vulnerable and you are not you can afford to go off three tricks.
- 4. If you are sacrificing at a level below game then generally you should work on the assumption that you can only afford to go off one or two tricks, but you are less likely to be doubled by your opponents.

Penalty scores may be found on the back of the double card so you can familiarise yourself with them.
